

Grassroots Pantry, Sheung Wan

While the prospect of a rich 18 course meal is exciting for any hungry foodie, sometimes it's overkill. For anyone after something a little lighter, [Grassroots Pantry](#) focuses on healthy, organic options serving up plates of 'food that heals'. The menu is completely vegetarian, with plenty of vegan, Buddhist-friendly and gluten-free options too - one of a kind in Hong Kong. Their focus is on wholesome, flavoursome ingredients and being uber-sustainable - think koji-smoked carrot bagels, and vanilla chia seed waffles loaded with sweet compote, cinnamon sugar and maple syrup. They make being eco-friendly look easy, with a set breakfast menu Monday to Friday from 9am to 11am and a special brunch menu on the weekends from 9am to 4pm.



Bread & Beast, Wan Chai

With a traditional and healthy option sorted, it's time to turn full fusion: The founders of 'Beast Brunch Club' are firm believers that great meals come in sandwich form and after brunch here, we wholeheartedly agree. Go for the eggs Benedict - available with suitably local twists, including char siu pork neck, ginger scallion crème fraîche and kumquat purple cabbage slaw - or the 'beast croissant' stuffed with beef brisket, scrambled egg and tomato jam. Lighter, gluten-free additions are also on offer, including cauli-rice and coconut yogurt.

Under the skin of Odaiba

In the 1850s, daiba (island fortresses), were built in the Tokyo Bay area for defense. In 1860, Odaiba was established as a port and shipyard, home to the Japanese-US fleet HQ. Today, after the expansion of the seaport district in the 1990s, Odaiba is a thriving shopping and entertainment district. Despite its small size, Odaiba is bursting with fun activities, great spots to eat and lively ways to spend your day...

Getting there

You can take one of two Shuto Expressway lines. The Wangan Route enters from Shinagawa Ward, through the Tokyo Port Tunnel, whereas Route 11 crosses the Rainbow Bridge. Get off at Odaiba-Kaihinkoen Station.

Breakfast

Hop off the train and head straight to the slick, Hawaiian inspired [Island Vintage Coffee](#) shop. Lounge on the terrace and take in the view as the shimmering water reflects Rainbow Bridge. Order a steaming cup of 'Hawaiian specialty' - a tropical, caffeinated sensation. Line your stomach for a day of fun activities with either the seasonal, fruity acai bowl, or their chunky honey ham and avocado sandwich.

Following breakfast, stroll down the promenade to find Odaiba's pint-sized [Statue of Liberty](#). It's a smaller replica of Manhattan's sculptured landmark, erected in 1998 as an acknowledgment of Japan's relationship with France. Due to its popularity, it found a permanent home in front of Tokyo's Rainbow Bridge. Though smaller, one might not pick up on that on first glance, so it really feels like you're experiencing a snippet of NYC from the other side of the world.

Morning

Now that you're fuelled up for the day and have checked one of the biggies off your list, it's time to get educational. While you're fresh and ready to absorb some info, walk through the winding paths of [Metropolitan Shiokaze Park](#) to the [Museum of Maritime Science](#). It's pretty hard to miss, given it's shaped like an enormous ocean liner. It hosts a number of sea-themed exhibitions, a fitting set-up considering the maritime history of Odaiba itself. Be sure to check out Nelson's Ship in a Bottle. Keep in mind that it's closed on Mondays.

Lunch

Museum complete, it's time for a bit of relaxation and cultural exploration in [Oedo Onsen Monogatari](#). Before you take a dip, head to the main hall for a light sushi lunch or ramen bowl. The space is set out to resemble a Japanese summer festival - street food, games and colourful lanterns abound.

Oedo Onsen is not your average hot-spring: you're transported into another world - one altogether more relaxing - as you don a yukata (a summery kimono), pop your phone in a locker and receive a payment wristband so you don't even have to carry a purse around with you. Step into a dreamy, mineral-dense bath, or if the day's exploits have really taken it out of you, collapse into one of the heavenly tatami rooms and have a nap.

Early evening

Feeling suitably pampered and refreshed, jump on the train at the Telecom Center just down the road and travel to Aomi. You'll spot the [Palette Town Daikanransha](#) before you get there: a 100-metre high Ferris wheel, it gives you a bird's eye view of mainland Tokyo and Mount Fuji. Try to hit it at dusk when the view is more shiny and magical than a Christmas tree.

Dinner

Expect a food coma when you eat at Prince and Princess: it's a delightful Thai menu and we recommend sharing plates to try as much as possible. Start with the appetizer platter - the fresh spring rolls and piquant Thai sausage will kick your taste buds into overdrive. The som tam salad is packed with peanuts, tiny dried shrimp and lush green papaya, and makes a refreshing accompaniment for coconutty prawn green curry with sweet basil, and mustard spinach rice noodles. We suggest skipping dessert and hitting a nearby ice cream shop...

Ice Cream Stop

You've got two quality options just on your doorstep once you leave the Prince and Princess. Head to Hobson's and start an addictive relationship with their flavour blend of raspberry yogurt and blueberries. Alternatively, Or you can dabble with something more unusual from Mou Mou, where they use milk rather than cream - a traditionally Japanese method. Steer away from your usual go-to and try their pumpkin paste ice cream. Trust us, it works. It's manned with friendly staff who know a thing or two about ice cream, so ask them for help if you're unsure.







Basel is home to all things artsy, architectural and cultural, the mesmerizing Rhine River, a medieval old town centre and plenty of ways to spend your day. Got 24 hours to spend in Basel? No problem...

hi tip: Before you start your day, get a BaselCard from the hotel concierge. It's a golden ticket to discounts all across the city, including free use of public transport and 50% off at numerous attractions and museums.



Breakfast

Perfectly located for a day of explorative tourism, [Bistro Kunstmuseum](#), at the Basel Arts Museum is an elegant breakfast option. Start your day off strong with their homemade bircher muesli with whipped cream, or their melt-in-your-mouth salmon.

Morning

Fed and ready to rumble, head into the [Kunstmuseum Basel](#) and take in Switzerland's biggest, most significant art collection, including early Rembrandt and an incredible Fussli exhibit. The building is a heritage site of national significance, so absorb as much of its architectural glory as your eyes can muster. It manages to achieve the perfect balance between unique, small and personable, while still being pretty massive. It's right in the center of Basel, in front of a tram stop.

When you're finished, walk the short distance to Bankverein and get the number 8 tram to Kleinhüningen Walk.



Lunch

When it comes to cities with famous rivers, such as the Rhine River in Basel, you want to spend as much time near it as possible. That's why we recommend [Freiluftrestaurant & Bar Landestelle](#), an open-air bar and restaurant. It has the most incredible, unobstructed view of the water and a simple, rustic atmosphere. Sip on a snazzy cocktail and tuck into a delicious mezze sharing platter, including assorted charcuterie, fresh fruit and creamy cheeses.

For a quirky start to the day, get yourself to Ratchathewi station for a trip to [Caturday Cat Café](#): the breakfasts are tasty - especially if you accompany it with a banging double berry smoothie - but the main purr-pose of coming here is to surround yourself with cute feline friends. You can sit on the floor and interact with the kitties in residence while you fuel up on the likes of multi-coloured rainbow crepe cake, bacon spring rolls and matcha lattes. This place has been known to have queues down the street so get here early or be prepared to wait.

At eight stories high and with over 2000 shops to explore, it's highly likely to have just about anything you could possibly need.

[I'm Park](#) is equally close, a lot smaller, and still offers some great shopping outlets worth visiting. This community mall has everything from small boutiques to big name brands, so if you fancy a less all-consuming shopping experience, it's a good shout.

Accompany your quinoa charcoal burger with their Burmese tea leaves: it's a winning combination.

If you're more in the mood for traditional Thai food (when in Bangkok, right?) get yourself straight to [Jim Thompson](#), which is just by the [Arts and Culture Centre](#) from this morning. Somewhere between their Khao-Chae, stir fried rib eye steak and mango cheesecake, you'll fall in love.

Not far off from your pampering is [Wat Pathum Wanaram](#) Bhuddist temple, founded by King Rama IV as a place for worship. Its large pond separates the car park from the temple, so once you're temple-side, you feel completely removed from the busy city, instead cloaked in tranquility as you meander the courtyard.

If you're into temples, then you're in the right city. Another incredible temple to visit is the [Grand Palace](#) (pictured). Alternatively, head to [Wat Arun](#) on the Chao Phraya River bank. Its namesake, the Hindu god Aruna, is often thought to symbolise the light from the rising sun.

Make sure you make a reservation.





Now you'll be feeling like one of two things: dessert or a nightcap. Thankfully, Bangkok night markets nail both, within a buzzing atmosphere that entices you to stay up way past bedtime. Head to [Art Box night market](#) and enjoy all the stalls and street food there is on offer. Sweet rice dishes are always delicious - keep your eyes peeled! It's in Khet Khlong Toei, which is central but a bit far to walk. So why not jump on a tuk-tuk? They're fun, reasonably priced and a Thai must-do.



After hours

A night out in Bangkok is world-renowned, but you've got to start it right. [Havana Social](#) has you covered for delicious cocktails to kick things off. Before you get there, be warned: there's a strict dress code - no big bags, backpacks or luggage allowed, and gentlemen are required to wear trousers and closed shoes. What is allowed is Cuban music, great cocktails (mojitos specifically) and excellent service.

Though Havana Social is open late, it's also a stone's throw away from Insanity Nightclub, Sugar Club Bangkok and Boulevard Beer Garden, so the night never really has to end.

You could probably spend an age wandering through Osaka's streets, soaking up the architecture, nightlife and enviable street food at every turn. But if you've not got time to squander, follow our 24-hour whistle-stop tour and uncover the absolute best of this city...

Breakfast

While you've been getting a good night' sleep to ready you for a day's exploration, [WestWood Bakers](#) were up at dawn preparing freshly baked bread for your breakfast. With its urban-rustic atmosphere, this place encompasses all things cosy and neighbourly, attracting both tourists and locals alike. Though anything that includes their freshly baked bread is delicious, the croque monsieur is particularly dreamy.

Morning

It's always best to do your museum stint when you're full and bright-eyed enough to absorb a few facts. Head to the [National Museum of Art](#), between the Dōjima River and the Tosabori River, to browse a range subterranean Japanese pieces and work by the likes of Picasso, Cézanne and Yayoi Kusama. Just the frame-like, modern exterior itself, designed by international architect César Pelli, is worth ogling at!

Alternatively, right right next door sits [Osaka Science Museum](#) - a simple, cylindrical building that juxtaposes the Museum of Art with an appealing sense of symmetry. Its focus is space and energy, offering interactive displays and a wicked planetarium with projections suitable for both adults and children. It's closed on Mondays.

Jump on the train at Namba station to Yodoyabashi (it's a 30 minute ride but it's well worth it). Here you'll find the atmospheric archway gate of the Showa era. Step through the arches and you'll enter [Hozenji Yokocho](#) alley, a sudden switch from metropolitan buzz to cobblestones and culture. The narrow street is lined with old, traditional restaurants and food stalls that bring to life the historical richness of Osaka.

If you're in the mood for a sit-down meal, take a short walk down the alley to [Yakiniku M Hozenjiyokocho](#) for its famed yakiniku (grill-style) steaks. If you feel like getting more hands-on, you can also hire a private room to do the meat-grilling yourself.

Head to [Osaka Castle Park](#) and nature commune. The imposing building in the centre of it all is everything you could want from a Japanese castle: surrounded by cherry and plum trees and dating back to the 1500s, it's a straight-out-the-picture-book, almost fairytale-like structure, puncturing the otherwise natural landscape. You could spend a whole day here in itself exploring the greenery and intricate architecture. But by now, you're probably a bit hungry, so hop on a train at Morinomiya Station and head to Sakaisuji Hommachi for dinner.

You can't visit Japan without trying okonomiyaki (pancake), and you can't have a hankering for okonomiyaki in Osaka without eating at [Fukutaro](#). You have the option to eat and observe the chefs at work from the counter, or you can sit on tatami mats if you're in a group. Try the butatamayaki (sliced pork okonomiyaki): it's crunchy on the outside, soft on the inside and packed with flavour. Get there early, because it's known to have people queueing down the street.

You know that little spot that's left once you've finished a Japanese feast of shredded meat and pancakes? It's best filled with a delicate eclair or macaroon from [La Maison du chocolat](#). This world-famous, Paris-born chocolatier offers an array of fancy treats and is the perfect decadence to finish off your day.

hi tip: try the local confectionary...

When you visit the States, there are certain sweets and chocolates you tend to stockpile for friends at home. Turns out Osaka is no different: make sure you get hold of some matcha flavoured KitKat (just wait until you try it) and a few packs of KORORO fruit gummies.

You don't have to roll very far from your chocolate stop to find a night-cap: [Bar Moon Walk](#) is your go-to if an extensive cocktail list is what you're after, while [Marciero](#) is the best spot in town for craft beer lovers. [Bar Creek](#) is where you want to be for live music, while [Shot Bar Himenya](#) explains itself. If in doubt, have a wander in Kita Ward and go where the wind takes you.

Start your day in Kyoto's geisha district, Gion, brimming with brightly coloured kimonos, the wooden [Tatsumi Bridge](#) and a plethora of upscale restaurants and boutiques on Hamamikoji Street. Just off Hamamikoji street is [Gion Niti](#) - a machiya, or traditional townhouse, that doubles as café by day and bar by night.



Gion Niti serve *kakigori*, or shaved ice, made from blocks shipped from the Tochigi Prefecture mountains (north of Tokyo). It's basically a Japanese snow-cone and it's deliciously refreshing. Alongside this, order a bowl of the Japanese take on porridge: the Abekawa rice bowl, with black honey and roasted green tea.

Take a leisurely northward stroll through [Maruyama Park](#) and explore this green space's popular statues and blossom canopies, as well as [Shōren-in Monzeki Temple](#), [Chion-in Sanmon](#) and [Yasaka Shrine](#).

Once you've had your fill of the many things the park has to offer, keep heading north until you reach the [National Museum of Modern Art](#), which boasts impressive local 20th-century art as well as rotating exhibits. Alternatively, just next door is one of the oldest art museums in Japan, [Kyoto Municipal Museum of Art](#), which features paintings and sculptures by local artists.

With the kids? You're right by the [Kyoto City Zoo](#).

For lunch, head to [Nishiki Market](#) by hopping on the train at Okazaki Koen, getting off at Shijokawaramachi and walking the short remaining distance. This market is 400 years old and still as buzzing as ever. Whether you're looking for fresh produce, seafood, meat, cooking utensils, or a deep fried prawn nibble and skewered sweet fish to keep you going while you shop, the lively, friendly atmosphere will put you in a great mood.

It's visited annually by pilgrims paying tribute to the gods of prosperity, good harvest and home safety. Of the 30,000 Inari shrines across Japan, Fushimi is considered the main event.

Particularly fond of saké? Head to [Saké Bar Yoramu](#) in Nakagyo Ward.



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Dinner

After your saké stop, head to Kyoto station for dinner at [Katsukura](#). This place has been passed through generations of Kyoto locals, becoming a well-loved spot and an absolute treat for visitors. They're known for their tonkatsu: crumbed, deep fried pork cutlets, served piping hot, tender on the inside and crispy on the outside. It comes with a sesame dip that you grind yourself in a tableside pestle and mortar.

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
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

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

hi tip: There's a busy schedule ahead, with limited public transport available. While walking is definitely doable, we recommend hiring a motorcycle for the day, provided you drive safely and study the routes before you leave.

Sunrise

Waking up at 6am isn't for everyone, but if you can muster it, the sunrise from [Khao Rang Viewpoint](#) is magnificent. Whether you're angling for the perfect photo or just want to sit in a dozy daze and contemplate its immense beauty, you will forever remember this fiery view over Phuket City.

If you head down Rang Hill towards the historical district of Phuket City (the island's capital), you'll find Phuket Old Town. There, you can spot the monks roaming the old streets of the city to receive alms from the most fervent Thai Buddhists in exchange for a benediction.





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Breakfast

There are two markets abuzz by this time; Downtown Market and the Public Fresh Market, where you must try some local breakfast foods. Feast on Khao Tom (boiled rice), iced tea or coffee, and patonko (Thai donuts) available at the many restaurants and stalls found on and off Ranong Road.

It's worth roaming the streets of Phuket's Old Town to get your fill of cute and cool independent shops, as well as some captivating architecture. The core of the Old Town is essentially made up of several sois (small streets) and five main roads: Rasada, Phang Nga, Thalang, Dibuk and Krabi. This quarter teems with history and is on a steady incline after years of neglect.

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





It's a fact universally acknowledged, that books plus coffee equals pure bliss. Head to King's Cross station and straight to Granary Square to start your day. Along the river, you'll find [Word on the Water](#) - once a barge, now a bookshop. Hop aboard the next barge along and you'll find great coffee and stellar toasted sandwiches. If it happens to have gone sailing, then a pancake breakfast at [Caravan](#) on the opposite side of the square, is also a good option.

Anyone who grew up on a hearty diet of Roald Dahl and picture books will melt when they discover [The House of Illustration](#). Monthly exhibitions pop up on rotation at this lovely gallery, which is tucked just behind Granary Square, but its inaugural permanent exhibition is the one to write home about: the works of national treasure Quentin Blake are displayed here, illuminating how the famed illustrator brought immortal stories like *The BFG* and *The Twits* to life.

Now back to that barge: [Word on the Water](#) is a 1920s Dutch barge that once sailed down Regent's Canal, but has taken permanent mooring in Granary Square as a floating bookshop, reminiscent of the romantic barge along the Seine that Nina George conjures in *The Little Paris Bookshop*. Though books is the primary focus, they often host jazz performances too.




Ready for some more nostalgia? Well get



Get swept up in the secret garden terrace at the heart of Bloomsbury and be sure to sample the fish and chips - the little book icon next to it on the menu signals that £2 of the meal goes to the National Literacy Trust.





The greats

You're in a real hub for literature, where writers have been known to hangout throughout history. Head to the [Charles Dickens Museum](#) to discover the best and worst of times for this famous novelist, including his work as a social campaigner.

Alternatively, do a mini pub crawl to see where the likes of Dylan Thomas and George Orwell spent time away from their writing desks: [Fitzroy Tavern](#) was an escape for both while they worked at nearby BBC offices; channel TS Eliot with a drink at the [Marquis of Granby](#); or make like Anthony Burgess and Anthony Powell by grabbing a pint at [The Wheatsheaf](#).



Dinner

Make for [The Fable](#) by Chancery Lane – think good solid pub food – for a night of fairytale and Aesop's fables-themed whimsy, surrounded by piles of leather-bound books and typewriters. Make the Mad-Hatter proud with an enchanted teapot cocktail to share, while you suss out how many of the books you've read from their wordy wallpaper; before getting stuck into the likes of beef brisket with paratha bread and Korean slaw, or one of their many burgers. Do as Augustus Gloop would and finish it off with a chocolate brownie.





Brunch

Had enough of books yet? Thought not. To brunch or not to brunch is never the question, so head to [The Swan](#) at Shakespeare's Globe overlooking the [River Thames](#) - the full English is never a bad shout but we're putting in a special mention for their homemade Swan Bircher muesli.

You're on the doorstep of [Shakespeare's Globe Theatre](#), so take the time to do an incredible walking tour, which steers you through the bard of Avon's literary footsteps. There's usually a play running, but booking in advance is advisable.

If you've got more time and you're a particular Shakespeare fan, [book a day trip](#) to Shakespeare's Stratford and the Cotswolds.



Lunch

Nestled in Talbot Square, [the George Inn](#) is not only an authentic coaching inn and gorgeous oak-beamed, lattice windowed pub, it has a lovely courtyard for those elusive dry/sunny London days. It's also a spot regularly visited by Shakespeare, Dickens (who directly references the pub in *Little Dorrit*) and Geoffrey Chaucer, in whose *Canterbury Tales*, the pilgrimage sets off from this very courtyard.

It does simple pub food well and it's a relaxing space to sup G&Ts for hours.



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Book crawl

Head towards [Trafalgar Square](#) and along Tottenham Court Road towards Cecil Court - otherwise known as Booksellers Row. While independent bookshops are usually sparsely dotted around a city, this road is only bookshops! Alice Through The Looking Glass is where to head for Wonderland-inspired memorabilia, while Goldsboro Books is your go-to if you're after first editions or signed copies of bestsellers old and new. For the cartographers and historians out there, Bryars & Bryars antiquarian bookshop specialises in atlases, maps and rare historic volumes.

By this point, you may feel like you've been around the literary world in 80 hot seconds, so why not round things off with a laid-back meal at [Mr Fogg's Tavern](#) in Covent Garden, themed on Phileus Fogg's travels in Jules Verne's *Around the World in Eighty Days*.

It's a cosy spot to plough your way through a gin-heavy drinks menu. On the food front, we recommend ordering from the 'miniature marvels' section, which includes lovely little morsels like the pea and mint arancini with spicy sauce and homemade sausage rolls.




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Breakfast

A bit further north is [Sonnenborgh Observatory](#), a museum in a 19th-century observatory, equipped with telescopes and hosting exhibitions as well as stargazing events. [University Museum Utrecht](#) has an interactive science lab and a botanical garden while [Centraal Museum](#) offers a selection of art, fashion and history exhibitions.

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Lunch

Pedal your way to the best burgers in Utrecht: the towering beasts from [Meneer Smakers](#) Burgerbar, loaded with onions and a mound of fries, are plain naughty. You won't look at burgers the same again after trying out their Smakers sauce, made from a closely guarded family recipe. You can't really go wrong with the classic beef burger, but for any herbivores in your party, the walnut and red lentil Aunt Mila burger is also a good shout. Burgers are also available to go and you're right by a lovely green park on the river, if you feel so inclined.

Afternoon

If spending the afternoon moseying about the chapel, parks and gardens of Holland's biggest castle appeals, hop on the bus at Tolsteegbrug towards [Castel de Haar](#). Its neo-Gothic architecture is remarkable and the reflection off the water on a still, sunny day makes for brilliant photos. It will take you an hour to get there from the centre (or 30 mins by car), but it's well worth a full afternoon venture.

If you are heading back to central Utrecht, go to [Restaurant Bis](#) for dinner. A Dutch take on French cuisine, the restaurant has a lovely relaxed vibe, with friendly service and excellent food. It's on the Lijnmarkt, one of Utrecht's oldest, historically rich shopping streets, and looks out over Oudegracht canal and Dom Cathedral. The salmon tartare makes for a nice, delicate starter and the Marseillaise fish soup with shrimp, saffron rouille and gruyère.

If you would like to stay near Castel de Haar, then you have got to try nearby ['t Wapen van Haarzuilen](#). They've screwed with a classic prawn cocktail in the best possible way: a triumvirate of smoked eel, smoked salmon and Dutch shrimp in cocktail sauce sets your tastebuds ablaze and serves as the perfect starter before diving into mains like veal entrecôte with truffle gravy. Round things off with traditional warm cherry waffles - all kinds of YUM.

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After hours

One of the hottest spots for disco, house and techno in central Utrecht is [BASIS](#) nightclub, on Werf 97. It's open every Friday and Saturday with a banging lineup, often including international acts. If you get there before 11.30pm, entrance is cheaper and you're probably more likely to get your way to the front of the DJ booth. With a no-fuss, utilitarian, industrial-chic vibe, you're in for a treat if this is your kind of scene.

Amerikamura, first known as 'American Village' (hence Amerika-mura) and locally known now as Amemura, is the Kansai region's nucleus of creativity, fashion and entertainment for young people.

The area's dedication to the import of Western merchandise even went as far as to erect a towering Statue of Liberty replica. A word of warning: the blasting music and outlandish fashion can be a bit of a shock to the system, but follow our guide and you'll be en route to one glorious day in the city...

A big stack of pancakes is universally cherished and in this pocket of the world, the best place to head is [Gram Café & Pancakes](#). If you'd rather dabble with their French toast, sandwiches or eggs, they're all solid choices, but once you see this fluffy tower, food envy may take over. Whether you want yours draped in bacon, salmon, syrup or condensed milk, this haven for pancakes has your back. If you're feeling terribly indulgent – and why wouldn't you – try the tiramisu pancakes, while the 'health conscious' option comes loaded with fresh fruit.



Regardless, they're absolutely delicious and will give you the energy you need to keep exploring.



Just when you thought your shopping experience couldn't get madder, you'll stumble down the rabbit hole that is [Alice on Wednesday](#), Disney's Alice in Wonderland store. Entering Wonderland through the book-end shaped door is just the first step. Whether you want to don Alice's headband or buy a tote bag to fill with treats from the sweet table and little vials of colourful liquid (their labels of "eat me" and "drink me" being all too tempting), you'll feel like a kid again.

You can't roam Amemura without lunching on street food, you can't go wrong with takoyaki, and you can't deviate from [Koga-ryu](#) if it's takoyaki you're after. What started as a small takeaway front has transformed into a specialist joint for these delightful, octopus-stuffed dough balls. Better yet, it's on the doorstep of Sankaku Koen, AKA [Triangle Park](#), an unmissable hangout while you're in the area. Pick a bench and tuck in.

'Baba' is a term denoting mixed Thai and Chinese heritage - around 10,000 Phuket islanders can trace their lineage back to Peranakan or Straits Chinese immigrants, who largely migrated to work in Thai tin mines in the 19th Century - and each year, grand Baba weddings takes place in Sino-Portuguese mansions in the old town quarter.

This year's antics are taking place in Hongyok House. Be a part of the exuberant parade down Thalang Road, which includes red lanterns and a full-blown lion dance. It's free and open to the public - just make sure you dress respectfully (the more colorful the better). Avoid black altogether, as this largely symbolises mourning in Thai culture.




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Tenjin Matsuri (Water and light festival) - Kita Ward 24-25 July

This is a celebration of the lâle (tulip), which was a symbol of the Ottoman empire, presents work that borrows from the tulip patterns. A window into the elegance of Ottoman court culture, as well as a historical exploration of the cordial relationship between Turkey and Japan, this exhibit is well worth a visit.



To-ji Temple Flea Market 7 July

Held at [Toji Temple](#), a beautiful, large UNESCO world heritage site, this flea market is well-worth your time with its eclectic array of everything from knick-knacks to antiques. It's in front of Kondo Hall, one of Toji's original structures, so a great way to merge your culture and shopping fixes.



Gion Matsuri - traditional parade July

Gion Matsuri is arguably Japan's most famous parade, which takes place at [Yasaka Shrine](#). Given that it's a month-long event, you're likely to find a celebration happening throughout July, especially in the evenings when the roads are closed to maximise festive fun. However, the main parade - a procession of floats - is on 17 and 24 July and follow three kilometer routes along the streets of Shijo, Kawaraamachi and Oike.
